



# PROVIDING big support FOR michigan's little ones

Becoming a parent is hard. Really hard. Between taking care of a baby, managing expenses and still finding time to take care of yourself, it can feel overwhelming. And for some Michigan families facing insufficient resources and limited social support, new parenthood is even more challenging.

As a resourceful mother of three, Khadeejah Alazi understands the financial burdens of parenthood all too well. She admits, "It's a lot, saving money. It's hard to buy a lot of diapers when you have two or three kids."

That's why providing the necessary help is so critical. Since 2020, Priority Health has expanded its support to meet the diaper needs of many families across Michigan. Priority Health volunteers and donations supported the Metropolitan Detroit Diaper Bank (MDDB), Catholic Charities of West Michigan, Grand Traverse Baby Pantry and United Through Motherhood in Benton Harbor. These partnerships helped bring one of the most



important infant and toddler essentials to area parents, so they can focus on raising the next generation of healthy Michiganders.

For Veronica Claybrone, founder and director of the Metropolitan Detroit Diaper Bank, the ongoing support has made a tangible positive impact in the communities she serves. "The diaper need is no joke, and I'm forever grateful to Priority Health for realizing it," she said. "The sponsorship and flexibility have given us the ability to get the team moving and get more people on board to do more (diaper) distributions to the disenfranchised populations we serve."

"The partnership has helped show that the diaper need is a health issue," Veronica added. This year, Priority Health and the MDDB hosted curbside diaper giveaways for National Diaper Need Awareness Week at high-need locations like the Corewell Health Dearborn Hospital. Over 70,000 diapers were handed out.

# NATIONAL breastfeeding month

For those who are able, breastfeeding is proven to be beneficial to almost all breastfeeding parents and infants.<sup>1</sup> Breastfeeding rates among historically marginalized women — who are already disproportionately affected by adverse health outcomes<sup>2</sup> — are far lower than those of other racial groups.<sup>3</sup>

As a pillar of our Priority Health for Good corporate responsibility initiative, our commitment to maternal and infant health includes addressing racial, economic and societal disparities.

This year, Priority Health supported five grassroots organizations covering the cost of new mama care kits, class registrations, diapers, doula support and even positive health movement initiatives.

# HELPING kids be kids WITH mental health programs

Kids today are facing challenges and hardships on a level unlike any before. With the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reporting that nearly 30% of students had poor mental health in 2023<sup>1</sup>, mental and behavioral health among school-aged children isn't just a problem. It's an epidemic in need of serious attention.

With half of Michigan parents expressing concerns for their kids' mental health<sup>2</sup>, the trials surrounding childhood mental health hit far too close to home. It's simply not enough to wait and respond after a crisis happens. Priority Health for Good has developed strong partnerships and innovative ways to focus on upstream support, helping build resilience in children earlier to reduce mental health crises.

# thin mints®, GIRL SCOUTS MAKE mental health a priority

Launching in May for Mental Health Month, Priority Health committed to “Tagalong®” with the Girls Scouts of Michigan Shore to Shore in promoting mental health wellness across the state. Helping bring a national patch program promoting mental health wellness to troops in 30 Michigan counties, Priority Health covered the cost of badges to remove the financial barrier so the scouts could keep their focus where it belongs: mental health.

Girls experience mental health crises at nearly double the rate of boys according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, a disparity that fueled the partnership. The program offers guidance for troop leaders to address these concerns and step-by-step actions for scouts to earn patches like “Knowing My Emotions” and “Finding My Voice.”

As one scout said, “I learned that it’s OK to have feelings. And you can try and talk to somebody because maybe they have ideas to help you get you through them.”

The mental health program emphasizes the importance of prioritizing mental and emotional wellness and provides educational tools and resources to help empower youth to build resilience early, which can improve long-term outcomes.

Together, Girl Scouts and Priority Health helped increase access to the program by covering the cost of 562 total patches. Marissa Roberts, parent of two scouts in the program (and former scout herself), expressed her gratitude for the program. “I appreciate being able to have these conversations early and giving girls the wording to verbalize feelings and concerns.”

# fido, heal!

## PRIORITY PUPS™ DEMONSTRATES ACADEMIC AND EMOTIONAL IMPACT IN MICHIGAN CLASSROOMS.

Since launching more than a year ago, Priority Pups™ has tails wagging. The signature program of the Priority Health for Good corporate responsibility initiative is making mental health a priority “fur” all.

In collaboration with the nonprofit Canines for Change, the program supports a variety of behavioral health and educational needs in a space where students spend much of their time: the classroom. These dogs are not pets or mascots. They are highly trained facility animals assigned to in-school adult handlers who assist students facing challenges with emotional regulation and learning.

Students like Shelby have experienced positive changes thanks to the beloved goldendoodle facility dog, Meeka.

Shelby's mother, Laurie Uhl, shares how Meeka has made a difference in her daughter's life. Shelby lives with ADHD, autism and Fragile X syndrome, conditions that can make school challenging. Laurie recalls instances when Shelby was experiencing a tantrum or meltdown, and Meeka's presence helped bring calm and comfort. “It's like a switch,” says Laurie. “I can just see a breath of air just kind of wash over her. And she finds comfort.”

**Studies show<sup>1</sup> that support dogs can help provide stability and comfort, reduce stress, improve reading scores and offer social and emotional support.**

“The impact of Meeka has been immense,” says social worker Kaleigh Salata of her school's assigned dog. “She supports students in a variety of ways. We frequently see her walking up toward students and sitting next to them. They may not need to talk or want to talk, but Meeka just absorbs that emotion ... that they're experiencing.”

With two Pups placed and working their tails off in Michigan schools and three pups scheduled for placement in 2025, the results are proving overwhelmingly “paw-sitive.” One student, Marcus, explains, “When I need a break when I'm frustrated, I come here because Meeka helps me in a lot of different ways.” Steve Minard, principal of North Godwin Elementary, adds, “We're very appreciative of the fact that we were given this gift. It's had a huge positive impact on our school.”

Follow **#PriorityPups** and **#PriorityHealthforGood** to stay “pup-dated” (last pun, we promise) as the program continues to grow and make a tangible impact in classrooms across the state.

# MARANDA: how's it really going?

As part of the Priority Health for Good advocacy pillar, we partnered with local organizations and journalist Maranda, with WOOD-TV, for a six-month mental health public service campaign called "How's It Really Going?"

By bringing often invisible struggles to light, the partnership highlights mental health challenges unique to young people. Through segments on-air and online, families, educators and students gained access to resources supporting adolescents with mental health concerns. They received practical guidance on difficult topics like returning to school, navigating eating disorders and managing holiday-related stress, with an emphasis on building awareness and providing proactive support strategies.

That awareness has been invaluable to families and educators who have had direct experience with the need for visibility. As one faculty member said, "I am a principal for GRPS and constantly witness students who are missing that pivotal piece in their health. Hidden traumas, painful pasts, childhoods that were never lived — these can affect the physical body. My daughter has seen a therapist since she was 9. Mental health is physical health. I attribute many of my daughter's successes and strategies to the idea that we have always treated the whole child — mind and body."



The Detroit Pistons and Reimagine Life Foundation brought back the annual Celebrity Wheelchair Basketball Game for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic. Presented by Priority Health, the event brought together Reimagine Life Foundation's SportsAbility Program to raise funds to cover the cost of classes, training and equipment.

Appearances from influencers and professional athletes made the event a star-studded occasion to raise awareness and funds for adaptive sports access. Wheelchair athletes demonstrated their impressive skills and athleticism, while the Priority Health Total Health Foundation and Pistons presented a check for \$6,500 to the Reimagine Life Foundation. The event was a true win for the entire community.

## HOW FITTING! **FREE** SHOES FOR DETROIT'S FIRST-EVER KIDS MARATHON

In conjunction with this year's 47th annual Detroit Free Press Marathon, Priority Health sponsored the inaugural Kids Marathon and, in partnership with Detroit Public Schools Community District, provided free running shoes and race registration to 250 young participants.

## JUST A FEW OF THE MANY VITAL PARTNERSHIPS IN 2024:



**Forgotten Harvest** continually meets the primary need of Detroit families — daily nutrition. Unlike traditional mobile pantry distributions, the Client Choice Market offers flexible appointments during off-hours, ensuring accessibility so that individuals facing food scarcity receive the support and resources they need to thrive.



**Hope Against Trafficking**, based in Pontiac, rescues and supports individuals involved in the sex trade, while also building awareness to prevent the crime. Survivors, often young teens, receive restorative care as well as education and independent living support.



**Life Remodeled** brings a one-stop opportunity and essential service hub for students, families and adults living on Detroit's far east side in its renovation of the former Denby school building into a life-giving community center.



**Figure Skating in Detroit** provides access to a sport usually out of reach to girls of color. This program helps Detroit girls transform their lives and grow in confidence, leadership and academic achievement as they master and compete in the sport of figure skating. **Detroit Horse Power** offers another sport usually inaccessible to youth of color in Detroit — horseback riding. Watch the video showing the monumental impact equestrian opportunities are making on Detroit's youth.





In partnership with the Detroit Riverfront Conservancy, Priority Health presented the Kids Zone and Kids Stage at the 2024 Detroit Harvest Fest & Food Truck Rally. With arts and crafts, an inflatable fun park, breakdancing and Halloween-themed science projects, it was a festive event that got the whole family out and moving on the Dequindre Cut in downtown Detroit.
